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Member News and Updates

Anna Hennessey, UC Berkeley

Anna is currently a visiting scholar with the Berkeley Center for the Study of Religion at the University of California, Berkeley. Her work looks at the intersection of philosophy, religion and art in different cultural contexts. She recently published a chapter in *Religion and Sustainability: Interreligious Resources, Interdisciplinary Responses - Intersection of Sustainability Studies and Religion, Theology, Philosophy*, a volume that has been chosen as part of Springer's 2021 UN Sustainable Development Goals (chapter name: "Chinese Images of Nature, Body and Cosmos: Visualizing Human Physiology and Homeostasis with the Natural World"). As the 2020-2021 President of the American Academy of Religion, Western Region, Hennessey created a video for her March 2021 Presidential Address about her current research, which relates to art, religion and philosophy in the context of Catalan culture. In June 2021, Hennessey also reviewed Veronica Rybanska's *The Impact of Ritual on Child Cognition* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2020) for *Reading Religion*, a publication of the American Academy of Religion (AAR).

Most recently, Hennessey has begun to publish videos she has created to be used in the teaching of graduate and undergraduate coursework. One video now available online through Academia.edu's new pilot program on video course creation relates to philosophy, art and religion in the context of medieval China (<https://www.academia.edu/courses/K1Ym91?tab=0&v=PEqm2E>).

Hennessey also recently began as an associate editor of *Sophia: International Journal of Philosophy and Traditions*.

**Kurtis Hagen, Independent Scholar**

I recently published a book titled *Lead Them with Virtue: A Confucian Alternative to War* (Lexington Books, 2021).

Drawing parallels with Daoism and Mohism, it challenges recent “just war” interpretations of Mencius and Xunzi, arguing that those interpretations derive Confucian criteria for the legitimate use of force that are too permissive. It argues that the “Confucian solution” to problematic situations is long-term-oriented moral leadership rather than military force, and that this position is not naïve.

I also published an article, “Xunzi and the ‘Great Pattern,’” in *International Communication of Chinese Culture* (2021), as well as the following book chapter: “Confucianism as a Tradition of Reconstruction: Returning to the ‘Way of Heaven?’” in *One Corner of the Square: Essays on the Philosophy of Roger T. Ames*, edited by Ian M. Sullivan and Joshua Mason (University of Hawaii Press, 2021).



Robert Allinson, Soka University of America

Professor Robert Elliott Allinson, Professor of Philosophy at Soka University of America, wishes to report that two reviews of his new book, *The Philosophical Influences of Mao Zedong, Notations, Reflections and Insights*, Bloomsbury Academic Books, 2020 have been published.

In addition, Professor Allinson has published his invited chapter, 'The Whirlpool of Time,' in *Daoism and Time, Classical Philosophy*, 2021, Livia Kohn, (ed.), St. Petersburg, Three Pines Press, pp. 119-132. In this chapter, different anecdotes from the *Zhuangzi* are called upon to illustrate both Time's prison and the means to escape from the prison of Time; e.g., the story of the Cicada Catcher, the story of Cook Ding, of the dream stories of Mengsun, the anecdote of the Butterfly Dream story, the story of the Old man and the Whirlpool, the story of the Cackling Goose and stories about the life of Confucius from the *Analects*. Professor Allinson, *en passant*, philosophizes about the difference between Zen Buddhism and Daoism. He compares and contrasts the elements that constitute the process of time in Empedocles, Heraclitus, Hegel, Marx, Laozi and the interactions between the Yin and the Yang.
